

## **Love Alliance Overall Goals**

**Goal 1:** Capable, inclusive, influential and mutually supportive KP<sup>1</sup> (communities of PWUDs, LGBTQI and Sex workers) movement in any unrestricted civil space

**Goal 2:** An end to sexual and gender-based violence, stigma and discrimination against KPs (communities of PWUDs, LGBTQI and Sex workers)

**Goal 3:** Equal Access to inclusive, people-centered, accountable and integrated HIV and comprehensive SRHR Services

Within the context of the Love Alliance, the term "KP" reflected in this goal and Theory of Change refers to People who use drugs, Sex workers and Lesbian, Gay, Bi-sexual, Transgender, Queer and Intersex persons, in their full diversity.

The above is not a prescription on what initiatives should be proposed in your application. In line with ISDAO's values of autonomy and self-determination, we strongly encourage applicants to propose initiatives that will respond or address the pressing sexual and reproductive health and rights advocacy related needs that affect their respective communities and see how they can be linked to the Love Alliance goals.

## **Communities' Advocacy Priorities**

In 2021, ISDAO conducted a community advocacy priorities development meeting with key representatives of communities from across the LGBTQI, Sex Worker, and PWUD communities, with 40 different organizations across LGBTQI, Sex workers and PWUD from across Nigeria represented. The advocacy priorities meeting provided a platform to understand which advocacy areas the three communities would like to focus on as a collective and how ISDAO can support this process during the Love Alliance Initiative. We advise applicants to carefully look at these priorities when preparing their grant application, decide which of these priorities connect to their work and then link this to the Love Alliance outcomes.

These advocacy priorities were collectively identified and developed by the LGBTIQ, Sex Worker, and PWUD communities during the advocacy priorities development meeting. ISDAO wishes to point out that this does not alter her value of autonomy and respect of partners' self-determination of priorities. Therefore, we encourage partners to primarily propose initiatives that meet the needs of their target communities and see if they are linked to one or more of these priorities.

Below are the three Advocacy Priorities set by the community representatives during the advocacy priorities development meeting:

**Priority 1:** Advancing social and economic opportunities for PWUD, Sex Workers and LGBTQI+ persons.

**Priority 2:** Improving access, availability, appropriateness, and affordability of holistic health services for PWUD, Sex Worker and LGBTQI+ persons.

**Priority 3:** Addressing discriminatory laws and policies to advance human rights for PWUD, Sex Worker and LGBTQI+ persons.
